PARTNERSHIP WITH ST. PAUL'S HOSPITAL COCHLEAR IMPLANT TEAM

Over the last year, IDHHC has been collaborating with the BC Adult Cochlear Implant Team at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver with the goal of having our audiologists provide diagnostic testing at our Victoria office that will assist in determining eligibility for cochlear implantation in potential candidates. This partnership would help to reduce the need for these patients to make multiple trips to the mainland as they proceed with their assessments. We also hope to support the reduction of the two year



waitlist time for assessments to the program. In addition, it strengthens our relationship with the BC Adult Cochlear Implant Program in promoting awareness and education regarding hearing health, treatment options, and other strategies to improve outcomes for individuals with severe communication impacts resulting from their hearing loss. IDHHC hearing health team is excited to have received funding from Mr. and Mrs. P.A. Woodward's Foundation to purchase the diagnostic equipment and test materials required to proceed with these assessments and we are grateful to the Ministry of Health for their support as well. We are happy to be working closely with the St. Paul's team who have provided invaluable ongoing training and support.

All referrals for cochlear implants will continue to be managed by the BC Adult CI Program at St. Paul's Hospital. If you have been referred already and are interested in having your candidacy testing completed at IDHHC, please reach out to the CI desk at the BC Adult CI Program.

HEARING HEALTH SERVICES

REFLECTIONS ON PAST EVENTS

Sixty individuals received information from the events IDHHC hosted in February; a Balance and Dizziness talk with Erica Zaia and a Tinnitus Q&A with Glynnis Tidball. Erica is an audiologist who focuses on vestibular services and has a clinic, Audio-Vestibular Clinic, in Vancouver. Glynnis is an audiologist at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver who focuses on specialized tinnitus care. These events had the option for online or in-person attendance. During Erica

Zaia's Vestibular talk, attendees learned about the inner ear vestibular system for balance, as well as learning about vestibular disorders that may cause vertigo or dizziness. At Glynnis Tidball's Tinnitus Q&A, attendees learned about tinnitus and management strategies for dealing with tinnitus. At both events, attendees were able to ask their vestibular or tinnitus related questions. Both events had positive feedback as attendees reported they learned a lot of valuable information and were able to receive answers about their related questions.

Does IDHHC offer Ear Cleanings?? ..we do now!

CERUMEN MANAGEMENT

IDHHC is pleased to offer cerumen (ear wax) removal appointments. Although having some ear wax is typical and healthy, ear wax should be removed when it is impacted, causing hearing loss, producing a feeling of fullness in the ear or causing itching, discomfort or pain. Also, ear wax can plug up hearing aids and impede the amplified sound from reaching the eardrum. Ear wax removal is done by first softening the ear wax with oil drops for a few days. At a cerumen removal appointment, the ear wax is removed by water irrigation and/or cerumen instruments. IDHHC has three audiologists certified in cerumen management, and there is a \$40 per ear cost for this service.

AUDITORY PROCESSING EVALUATIONS

IDHHC is also pleased to now offer auditory processing evaluations to individuals aged 4 and

up. Auditory processing is what our brain does with what our ears hear. An auditory processing disorder (APD) is a deficit in a person's ability to internally process or comprehend sounds. A few of the typical signs of auditory processing difficulties include: difficulty hearing in noise (outside of having a high frequency hearing loss), taking a long time to hear or respond, frequently asking for repetition, difficulty with following or understanding instructions, working very hard to hear or listen, and difficulty with attention or easily distracted. Auditory processing disorder is often treatable through auditory training exercises. Following an auditory processing evaluation at IDHHC, our audiologists make an individualized recommendation plan for possible auditory training options and for possible remote microphone technologies that can be beneficial for individuals with APD. Cost for auditory processing evaluation is \$400.

UPDATE ON NOLAN PHILP'S FIRST YEAR AT UBC

The Family and Community Services team are happy to once again spotlight Nolan Philp who is completing his first year at UBC. In our Spring/Summer 2022 newsletter, Nolan shared some

of his background and experiences as a teen with a severe-to-profound bilateral hearing loss. He is a remarkable young man with a diverse variety of interest and accomplishments. In the short interview below, our staff member Susanne Harnden took an opportunity to catch-up with Nolan on his experiences as he settles into UBC:

What were your challenges when you first moved to Vancouver and started at UBC? Growing up on Vancouver Island, I have visited Vancouver several times, but moving there full time was a big adjustment-being on my own in a BIG city. I live in student residence which helps with these changes. It is like living in a hotel 24/7! As for my studies here at UBC, just like high school I use my assistive hearing technology so I can hear my professors when they are presenting in a large lecture hall.

Have you met other Deaf or hard of hearing students? Prior to attending UBC, I already knew one D/HH UBC student who I met playing for the Canadian Deaflympic team. Since then, I've met another student my age who was in my mathematics class. We make use of the same transcription (closed captioning) service.

Have you been working with Disability Services at UBC - What learning supports have they provided you? Currently I am registered with the Accessibility Centre. They have provided closed captioning and assistive learning technology for me. Combining these services with sitting close to the front of the room allows me to better understand what the instructor is saying.



vou still playing hockey at **UBC?** Although I am very busy with my studies, I still try to play hockey once or twice a

week. It's important to get out and exercise! UBC has an intramural hockey league. I have a team with a group of friends, and we play games against other teams over the course of semester. Playing with the Canadian Deaflympic team last year motivated me to stay in the game.

As you can see, Nolan lives an engaged and active life! We wish him continued success in his studies and chosen career path.

THE VALUE OF PARTNERSHIPS

In my role at IDHHC I support families with deaf and hard of hearing children of all ages. Often my support and involvement with a family is during a transition or for a specific issue. These wonderful individuals are willing to work with me to poll their families and help me to determine if my ideas have validity – as well as to reach out to me if they notice a particular need.

This winter I partnered with Katelin Miller (TDHH in the Courtenay School District) and Kerry McLaren (TDHH in Campbell River) to determine interest and then promote a Red Cross Babysitting Course for Deaf and Hard of Hearing teens. THE FUTURE OF WORK: BC'S LATEST LABOUR MARKET OUTLOOK



The 2022 Edition of the BC Labour Market Outlook provides us with interesting information for the year ahead. It forecasts strong annual growth in the Vancouver Island/Coast (+1.5 per cent) as workers and employers alike take

advantage of comparatively lower housing costs while seeking the amenities of a larger city in centres such as Victoria and Nanaimo. The report states that two emerging sectors will continue to rise in demand: the "Clean Economy," of "green" industries assisting positively affecting climate change, and the "Care Economy," which provides services that care for the wellbeing of people.

Both these sectors play a critical role in B.C.'s economy today and for years to come.

Anticipating the skills and training needed to support all growing industries now will help prepare all of us for the future. The skills most employers will need workers to possess include: communication and listening skills, decision making/critical thinking skills, problem-solving, social skills, and an ability to adapt quickly to changing needs and goals. Those seeking work in the Care economy will also need physical fitness, while the Clean Economy will demand higher levels of logic/math and data analysis. Roughly 80% of new jobs will require post-secondary education.

Each individual coming in to see me has different needs or multiple needs, I like to find strategies for addressing all of the needs they may have. Helping people hear better and supporting their quality of life is very meaningful for me.

What do you find most challenging about your work? The limitations of what technology can and cannot do with individuals that I am working with. There are certainly times I wish I could wave my magic wand to create some technology that has not yet been invented.

Where are some of the places that you have travelled to? I have travelled to Spain as well as going to the Netherlands on a youth exchange. I have travelled all over the United States, particularly the midwest for clinical placements while I was studying to become an audiologist.

What is something we'd be surprised to learn about you? That I love doing crafts such as knitting and macrame. This often surprises people given my love of science and my science-based career.

What is your favourite meal? Popcorn.

What are some of your hobbies? Knitting, macrame, hiking, paddleboarding, and I love eating.:)

MEET JUSTINA MILES, RIHANNA'S SUPER BOWL HALFTIME SHOW ASL PERFORMER

Justina Miles made history Sunday night as millions tuned in to watch the Philadelphia Eagles take on the Kansas City Chiefs at the Super Bowl in Glendale, Arizona.

Miles, 20, is a deaf American Sign Language performer and signed the pre-show's "Lift Every Voice and Sing," sung by Emmy-award-winning actress Sheryl Lee Ralph, as well as the highly anticipated Apple Music Super Bowl Halftime Show helmed by mega-star Rihanna.

The moment made Miles the first female deaf performer for the Super Bowl's halftime show. In an email to CNBC Make It, Miles described the history-making opportunity as "a great honor."



Miles also made history as the first deaf person to perform the ASL rendition of "Lift Every Voice and Sing," known as the Black

national anthem, at the Super Bowl.

At a press conference Thursday, Miles called the song inspiring, empowering and representative of resilience.

It's an important moment "not only for me to share this experience with the whole world," she said, "but to really bring that empowerment to millions and millions of Black deaf people all over the country who've never really seen that before. I feel that is truly lifting every voice, even my voice."

"I value the opportunity to make it possible for all deaf people to enjoy these songs, and not have them miss out on the full Super Bowl experience," Miles tells Make It.

You may have seen Miles before: She went viral in 2020 after her version of the TikTok #crushonyouchallenge was shared widely across social media. In the video, Miles signs a verse and pays homage to rapper Lil' Kim's colorful 1997 "Crush on You" music video.

Miles, a Philadelphia native and current nursing student at HBCU Bowie State University, is hard of hearing, according to reporting from Billy Penn. Her mom is deaf, and her family is mixed with hearing people.

Miles was also part of the USA team that went to the 2021-22 Deaflympics in Brazil and won a silver medal as part of the 4x100 women's track relay team. She was the valedictorian at the Model Secondary School for the Deaf in Washington D.C., according to the National Association of the Deaf.

The 2023 Super Bowl pre-game show featured other deaf performers, including Oscar winner and Arizona native Troy Kotsur, who provided the ASL performance of the national anthem, and Colin Denny, from Navajo Nation in Arizona, who performed "America the Beautiful" through a blend of ASL and North American Indian Sign

Language.

More than 120 million viewers watched the Super Bowl halftime show in 2022, which featured Dr. Dre, Snoop Dogg, Eminem, Mary J. Blige and Kendrick Lamar. It was the first Super Bowl halftime show to feature ASL performers, including rappers Sean Forbes and Warren "WaWa" Snipe.

Miles hopes her performance will inspire others to "not to let any obstacles prevent you from achieving your dreams, and to always believe in yourself to go beyond," she tells CNBC Make It. She adds that her mom gave her the best advice heading out onto the main stage, "who told me that she already loves me, and that if I am my Philly Black Deaf self, everything would be amazing."

ASL performances of the pre-game show and halftime show were streamed live on YouTube.

GOOGLE DOODLE: KITTY O'NEIL'S 77TH BIRTHDAY

Today's Doodle, illustrated by Washington DC-based, deaf guest artist Meeya Tjiang, celebrates the 77th birthday of Kitty O'Neil, once crowned "the fastest woman in the world." Kitty was a legendary American stunt performer, daredevil, and rocket-powered vehicle driver who was deaf since childhood.

O'Neil was born on this day in 1946 to a Cherokee Native American mother and Irish father in Corpus Christi, Texas. When she was just a few months old, she contracted multiple diseases which led to an intense fever that ultimately left her deaf. She learned various communication modes and adapted for different audiences throughout her life, ultimately preferring speaking and lip reading mostly. O'Neil refused to see her deafness as a roadblock, often referring to it as an asset. She later found a love for diving, but a wrist injury and illness ended her chances of competing. However, she remained committed to fulfill her dream of becoming a professional athlete.

O'Neil began experimenting with high-speed sports like water skiing and motorcycle racing. A true action-lover, she also performed dangerous

acts such as falling from daunting heights while set on fire and jumping from helicopters. In the late 70s, she made it onto the big screen as a stunt double for films and TV series including The Bionic Woman (1976), Wonder Woman (1977-1979), and The Blues Brothers (1980). She was the first woman to join Stunts Unlimited, an organization for Hollywood's top stunt performers.

In 1976, O'Neil was crowned "the fastest woman alive" after zooming across the Alvord Desert at 512.76 miles per hour! She



drove a rocket-powered car called the Motivator and surpassed the previous women's land-speed record by almost 200 mph. Once she broke the women's record by a landslide, it became evident that she could likely beat the men's mark too. Unfortunately, her sponsors did not allow her to break the overall record as it threatened the status quo — they wanted to reserve the feat for a male driver. Legal action to fight this failed and O'Neil was never given the opportunity to break the overall record. However, this didn't hold her back from going on to break records piloting jet-powered boats and rocket dragsters.

A biopic about O'Neil's life, titled Silent Victory: The Kitty O'Neil Story, was released in 1979 and recaps the impressive Alvord Desert feat.

Thank you for inspiring us all to race towards our dreams, Kitty!

THE COMPANY YOU KEEP (2023 -)


